HOLDEN

ED

HOLDEN

HOLDEN

ED

HOLDEN

ED

Good, huh? I've been here five years. We just clicked right off the bat.

HOLDEN

You like the guards?

ED

Well, they like me. I'm polite.

HOLDEN

You know, I heard that you used to drink at the Jury Room.

ED

You mean in Santa Cruz? Yeah, those are good guys. I applied to California Highway Patrol. My mom spoke to the cops to get my psychiatric record expunged. Turns out my record didn't bother them at all, I was just too tall.

HOLDEN

Too tall. *Laughs* I mean I've heard of being too short, but . . .

ED

What?

HOLDEN

Nothing. It just seems . . .

ED

You think they lied to me?

HOLDEN

No.

ED

Well, cops like me because they can talk to me . . . more than they can talk to their own wives, some of them.

HOLDEN

Really. What do you talk about?

ED

You know, books, movies. I watch all the cop shows on TV.

HOLDEN

Do you know, uh . . . Joseph Wambaugh, "Police Story"? You ever watch that?

ED

*Laugh* Huge fan. I got a lot of my insights right there.

HOLDEN

Really? What kind of insights?

ED

HOLDEN

ED

HOLDEN

ED

HOLDEN

ED

HOLDEN

ED

We're just talking? I don't get to go someplace, do a bunch of tests?

HOLDEN

ED

HOLDEN

ED

HOLDEN

ED

HOLDEN

HOLDEN

ED

HOLDEN

ED

Well, what would you call it? A hobby? I'd say it's more than that. Look at the consequences. The stakes are very high. Is this helping? Are you getting what you came for?

HOLDEN

I think.

ED

Good.

HOLDEN

Can I – Could I just ask you something? Do you believe that prison can help you?

ED

Are you kidding?

HOLDEN

You think you shouldn't be in prison?

ED

I think it's shutting the barn door after the horse has bolted, somewhat.

HOLDEN

What do you think the state should do with you instead?

ED

Well, Holden, a lobotomy's not out the question.

HOLDEN

Lobotomy?

ED

Like Frances Farmer. You remember Frances Farmer?

HOLDEN

No.

ED

I loved Frances Farmer. She was an actress. They lobotomized her in the '50s. She was very smart and intense . . . very misunderstood. She was a lot like me.

HOLDEN

You don't think you could benefit from psychiatry.

ED

I already did all that in the institution. It didn't take. For me, I think surgery might give me the best chance.

HOLDEN

And if surgery doesn't . . . take, in this modern society, what do we do with the Ed Kempers of the world?

ED

HOLDEN

ED

HOLDEN

ED
